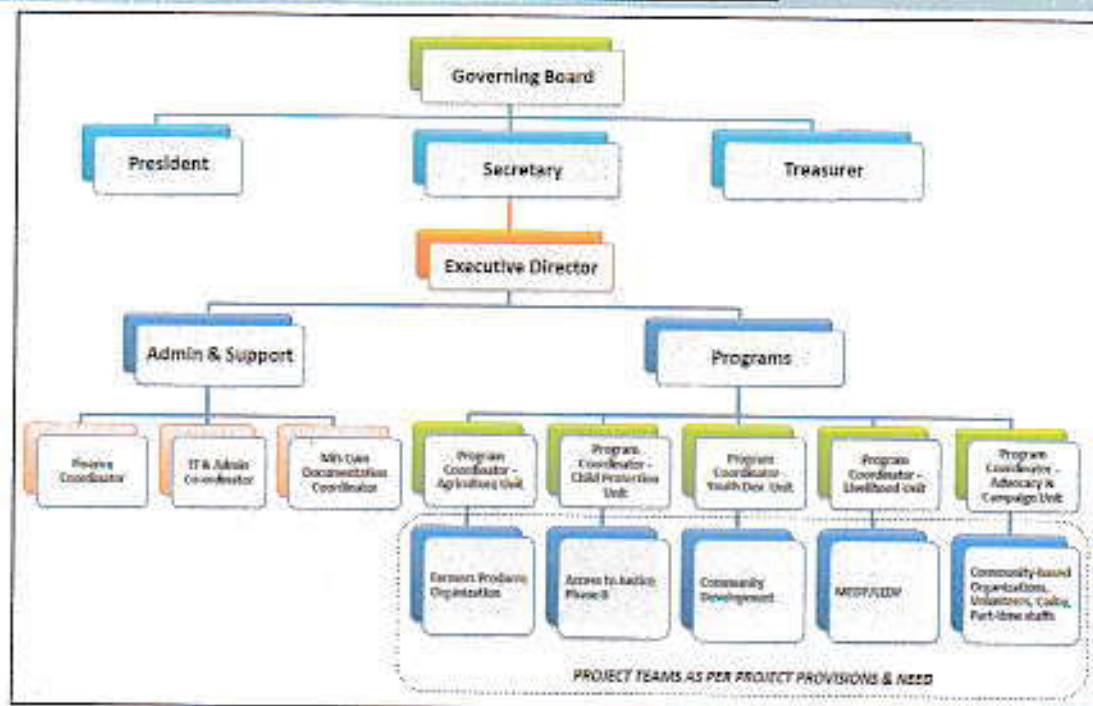

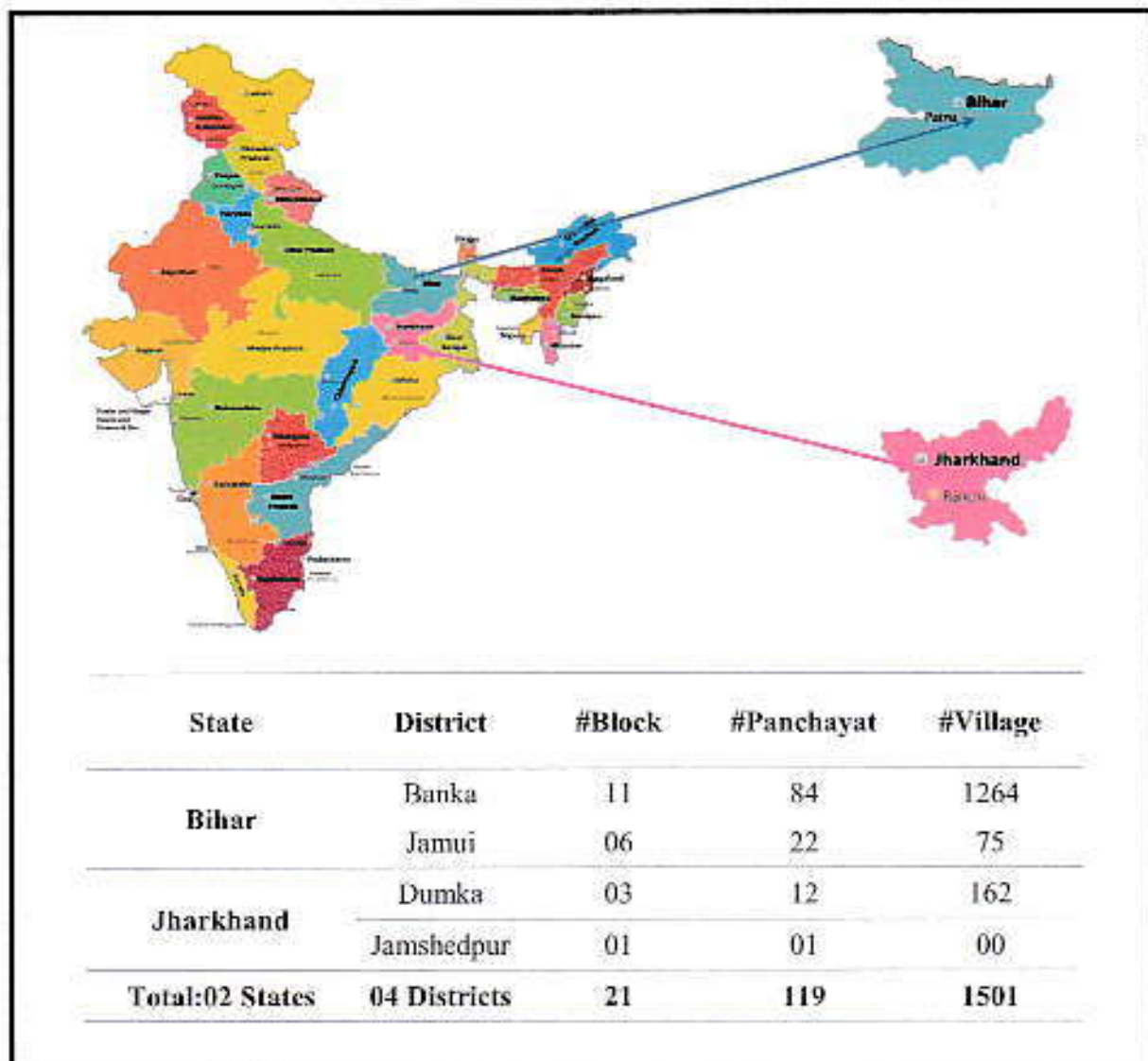


Our organizational Organogram

The Gram Nehru Yuva Trust (GNYT) proudly presents its annual report for the year 2023-2024, highlighting the impactful strides made through the 'Ensuring Access to Justice for Children (A2J) Phase-II' initiative. This collaborative effort, spearheaded by the Kailash Satyarthi Children's Foundation-US in partnership with GNYT, aims to establish a comprehensive framework for preventing and eliminating child marriage, child sexual abuse, and child labour/trafficking. By focusing on 50 villages, encompassing a population of 75,000 individuals, our



objectives include creating child marriage-free zones, securing pledges from diverse stakeholders, and fostering robust partnerships between civil society organizations and governmental bodies. This report underscores our commitment to safeguarding the rights and dignity of every child, paving the way towards a #Childmarriagefreeindiacampaign and #balvivahseazadi.

Project Goal/ Objectives:-

- ❖ Awareness on Child protection issues and services.
- ❖ Training and capacity building of stakeholders.
- ❖ Enhanced ability of CSOs.
- ❖ Behavior change through legal Action.
- ❖ Rehabilitative counseling and others services.
- ❖ Rescue of trafficked, sexually abused and forced into marriage children.
- ❖ To provide legal support to POC SO survivals

Role of GNYT/KSCF US

The role of GNYT/KSCF-US includes:

- ❖ Outline strategy and assist in creation of common minimum understanding of action, activities and outcomes
- ❖ Provide material for capturing of data and tools for converting the collected information into knowledge for experiential learning
- ❖ Develop IEC material for awareness raising



- ❖ Provide in-depth training for community social workers, and support persons on child protection issues and their roles and responsibilities
- ❖ Provide training and support on data collection app
- ❖ To work for the best interest of the children in the district with close co-ordination between the line departments.

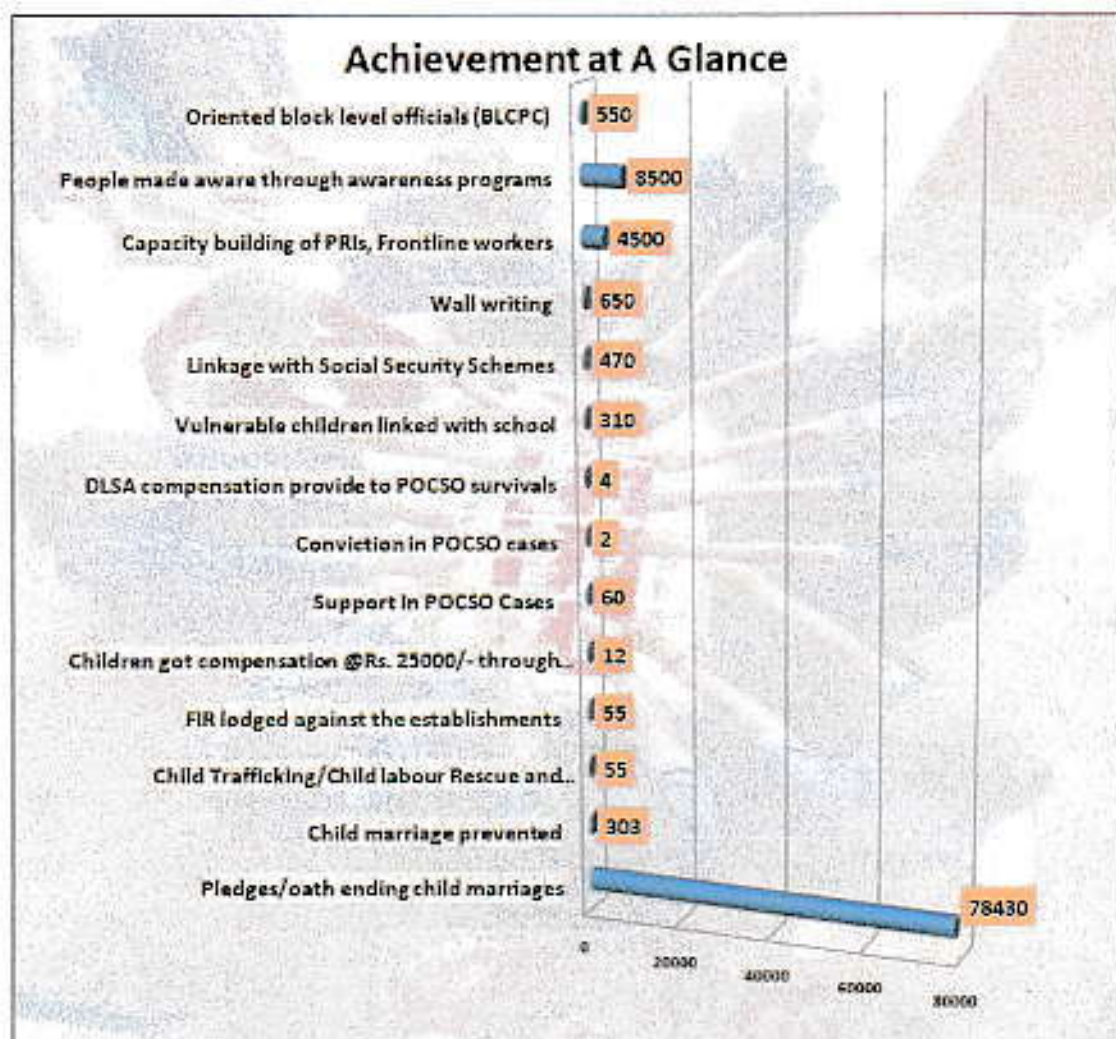
Major Achievements:

- ❖ **June Action month-** During the Action month with the collaboration of District Task Force rescued 8 child labour, 6 trafficked girls rescued.
- ❖ **100days campaign** - With the close direction of DLSA Jamui, we are conducted 100 days awareness campaign on Child marriage free Jamui in School and community. Prabhat Pheri, Quiz, Painting competition also organized in the 80 schools and 50 community covering 6200 children.
- ❖ **Celebrating special day at District Level Special Day-**The District level event has been conducted by the GNYT with the collaboration of Dist. Govt. officials. District level special days celebrated with different officials on different days are as follows 11 October 2023 with DDC. Total 233 Govt. official, stakeholders are participated in this program. During this event Govt. officials launch the Book "When Children-Have Children".
- ❖ **16 October 2023-** Child Marriage Free India event was conducted in Jamui District covering 50 villages in collaboration of district education department, DPRO,
- ❖ JSLPS, DCPU with 6000 women leaders and adolescent girls.
- ❖ **Pledge Program-** Total No of pledges under taken-78430 children and community people.
- ❖ **Child Marriage Prevented-** Total No. of 303 child marriage stopped through undertaken.
- ❖ **Lets March to School-**Total No. of Girls enrolled in school-206 and 104 boys enrolled in different schools.
- ❖ **Linkage with Social Security Schemes-**Total Number of 470 children and their family were linked from various schemes like sponsorship, Savitribai Phule Yojna, Pensions Schemes and Health Schemes etc.
- ❖ **Block Level Workshop-**Block level workshop organized in 5 blocks in Jamui Sadar, Gidhour, Barhat, Chakai and Khaira blocks of Jamui District. There are about 550 participant and Govt. officials are participated in this workshop. The Govt. officials gave them valuable advice and suggestion to stakeholders regarding Role and Responsibilities of members of BLCPC.
- ❖ **District level Event-** Organization takes some innovative effort for Awareness generation like 150 wall painting through our community workers with local meal at 150 community places.





- ❖ **POCSO Survival Compensation-** GNYT advocacy with DLSA to get compensation for POCSO survivals. As a result of GNYT efforts 4 POCSO survivals received Rs.19 lakhs from DLSA. And achieved in getting the accused convicted in two POCSO cases.
- ❖ **Capacity Building-** Conducted orientation program of police officials (Child welfare police officers) on POCSO.
- ❖ **Innovation-** 650 Wall writing done by the GNYT staffs in the 50 targeted villages of Jamui district in Bihar State. Awareness Rath run by the CMPO Cum SDO, Jamui. The awareness rath moved in 5 block's villages throughout the week with audio message and about 15000 pamphlets are distributed among the community on the issues of Child marriage Free India. Along With awareness rath GNYT's Nukkad Natak team also made aware of community on ill effects of child marriage.





Farmers Producer Organisation (FPO under NABARD scheme) Dumka

Gram Nehru Yuva Trust celebrates four successful years of its Farmers Producer Organizations initiative supported by NABARD, impacting five FPOs and empowering 3200 farmers. The GNYT remains dedicated to empowering and securing the livelihoods of small, marginalized farmers. We know that agriculture is the only major means of livelihood of the targeted area of the districts for which the farmers have been following the traditional and conventional methodologies with conventional equipments, resources and technologies. Due to this, they are lagging behind and facing a lot of problems in their food security, livelihood and entitlement. Hence the GRAM NEHRU YUVA TRUST took it as a mission to aware, educate and to impart trainings on various aspects for promotion of agriculture and ensuring entitlement. During the project period we have achieved many marvellous accomplishments.

Achievements/Result

- 3200 small and marginalized farmers linked with FPO for providing better opportunity of income generation, ensure livelihood.
- Organized 32 Gram Sabhas in 05 GPs of Dumka district. As result of it we have successfully formed of 05 FPO.
- Capacity build of 05 FPO members (500 members of each FPO) on book keeping and accountancy and poultry etc.
- Organized awareness generation program on farmers entitlement.
- We raised farmers' income by 45% during the project cycle by connecting them with FPO.
- Empowered 1200 women farmers, and the money earned after selling of the produce was directly transferred to the accounts of the women farmer of the family.

Case Studies

RENU'S STORY, BIHAR

Names changed. Renu Kumari is not pictured.

Renu Kumari, a 15-year-old girl, was usually going to her coaching class at 4:00 PM. One day, she did not return home at night. Her parents tried searching for her but could not find her. She had a cell phone and an unknown person had been calling her regularly. This person convinced her to run away. Her father lodged a complaint at the local police station.



Renu belongs to a lower middle-class family. Her father is a labour and her mother is a homemaker. She is studying in the ninth grade.

The police found her after a few days and produced her before the court. As per Renu's statement, the court ordered to add POCSO sections in the FIR. The case is now in trial and Renu is at home.

At this stage, counselors from Gram Nehru Yuva Trust, a partner organization of the Access to Justice program in Bihar, were put in touch with Renu and her family. Renu was experiencing severe trauma. Over the weeks, a relationship was built and Renu and her family eventually agreed that the legal team from Gram Nehru Yuva Trust could appear on their behalf and arrange testimony in court.

Gram Nehru Yuva Trust's intervention proved critical. With the support of the lawyer and a judge sympathetic to Renu's age and the nature of her case, she was able to give testimony. Other family members are now ready to give evidence.

Despite the traumatic incident, Renu continues her study in class 9. Gram Nehru Yuva Trust is in touch with her and doing regular counselling to help her come out from that trauma and supporting in legal aid in her case.



SONI'S STORY, BIHAR

Names changed, Soni is not pictured.

Soni, a 15-year-old girl, was returning from her sister's house when she was approached by two boys from her village. They offered her a lift home. As they were known to her, she trusted them. Unfortunately, they took her to a forest and sexually assaulted her for two days.

Once she managed to return home, she narrated the horrifying incident to her mother. Her physical state was a clear indication of the brutal assault. Her mother wanted to lodge a First Information Report (FIR) with the police, but many people advised against it to avoid public shame. Despite this, they decided to lodge the FIR.

Soni belongs to a lower middle-class family. Her father is a police constable and her mother is a homemaker. She has five elder sisters and is studying in the eighth grade.

The police started the investigation and presented the case in court. However, due to societal pressure, Soni's family was hesitant to give evidence.

Soni was experiencing severe trauma. Over the weeks, a relationship was built and Soni and her family eventually agreed that the legal team from Gram Nehru Yuva Trust could appear on their behalf and arrange testimony in court.

Gram Nehru Yuva Trust's intervention proved critical. With the support of the lawyer and a judge sympathetic to Soni's age and the nature of her case, she was able to give testimony. Other family members are now ready to give evidence.

The court convicted both the boys and they are now in jail. The court also ordered a compensation of 5 lakh to Soni. Despite the traumatic incident, Soni continues her study in class 8.



ADITI'S STORY, Bihar Names changed, Aditi not pictured

My name is Aditi Kumari, and I am fifteen years old. My life has been a rollercoaster of challenges, but today, I stand as a testament to resilience and hope. Let me share my story—the story of a girl who defied tradition, fought for her rights, and found her voice.



I was born into the Mushara community—a marginalized group in Bihar, India. Poverty clung to our lives like a persistent shadow. My father toiled as a daily wage earner, and my mother managed our humble home. Education was a distant dream; survival was our reality. I studied until fifth grade, but then the weight of poverty forced me to drop out. My younger sister, too, faced the same fate.

One fateful day, my parents informed me that I was to be married. The groom was a twenty-four-year-old man from a neighboring village. I was fifteen, and my dreams were still blooming. But dreams mattered little when hunger gnawed at our bellies. My parents, desperate and helpless, saw marriage as a way out of our misery. They didn't ask for my consent; they didn't consider my dreams. I was a pawn in their struggle for survival.

But fate had other plans. On that very day, a frontline worker named Vikas Mitra alerted the district coordinator. The impending child marriage was like a ticking time bomb, and they raced against it. The team—tireless and determined—knocked on our doors. They spoke of the ill effects of early marriage, of shattered dreams, and of legal consequences. They spoke for me when I couldn't find my voice.

My parents hesitated, torn between tradition and reason. But they listened. They saw the fire in my eyes—the fire that said, "I am more than a bride; I am a girl with dreams." They chose reason over tradition. Aditi's marriage was averted, and I felt a surge of hope. The chains that bound me loosened, and I glimpsed a world beyond poverty and early unions.

I joined the adolescent girls' group—a haven where dreams were nurtured. We learned about our rights, our bodies, and our worth. Education became my lifeline. My sister and I enrolled in a nearby school, our backpacks heavy with hope. The government's Mukhya Mantri Kanya Utthan Yojana embraced us, promising education, empowerment, and a chance to break free from the cycle of poverty.

Our hamlet echoed with a new resolve. Community members vowed never to promote or perform underage marriages again. Community Social Worker from Gram Nehru Yuva Trust, Jamui a partner organization of the Access to Justice Phase 2 Program, were put in touch with Aditi & her family. Aditi's story became a beacon—a reminder that dreams could flourish even in the darkest corners. My sister and I now tread a different path—one that leads to knowledge, independence, and a future we dare to dream.
